Re: ***Petition No: 0931/2019 "To Address Wholesale Abuses of EU Law by the Irish State – Particularly Regarding EU Citizens' Right to Access Justice" submission dated 17.09.2019.***

Dear Ms Montserrat / Dolores;

We attach for your attention, a copy of our urgent letter sent to you 'Under Seal' on February 24th last, asking you please, for some acknowledgement or response to that important correspondence.

Notwithstanding the difficulties that may have accrued at your Offices as a result of the Covid-19 crisis, we believe it is appropriate in context of the very serious matters outlined in our letter, that you please acknowledge and respond to that letter without delay – even if only by return email, so that we not again 'left hanging' indefinitely as to whether or not our official, legal communications are again either being unlawfully interfered with – or, are being contemptuously ignored – either of which scenario would of course be an ethical smear and an indictment on the supposed mandated 'professionalism' of persons in positions of considerable authority at the European Parliament.

We further respectfully refer you again, to the supporting evidentiary I-I Report we submitted to your Offices entitled, "*Criminality in the Irish Courts*" (v.1 attached again by email) for which we received NO acknowledgement or confirmation of receipt, and ask that you please now acknowledge receipt of the same; that you confirm that you have read it; and that you return to us with any comments or suggestions you may wish to make in that regard, noting in particular, the fact that you – as the Chair of the EU Petitions Committee have now been made formally aware of multiple, serious, repeat crimes being committed in Ireland – by agents and agencies of the Irish State – in flagrant violation of EU Law and of the European Convention of Human Rights.

As additional context within which we approach you again on these matters Ms Montserrat, we might further advise that our efforts to have these very same matters lodged as a formal application to the European Court of Human Rights met with similar clandestine obstructionism and stonewalling, with key documents being unlawfully suppressed and even destroyed by the Irish establishment before certain senior persons in the employ of the ECHR continued the subterfuge with false claims of letters being dispatched to us from the Registrar's Office, before running our application 'out of time' and destroying all materials without any right to challenge or appeal. Our subsequent complaints and requests of ECHR Registrar Mr Roderick Liddell to look into the matter – including providing him with the evidence of proven fraud and deception by one of his senior aides (Ms Pamela McCormick) was likewise ignored. Other attempts to have the matter addressed have resulted in the usual, inane and insulting generic responses which did not even afford the courtesy of a signature, and which in no way addressed in any substantive way, the troubling issues at hand.

We trust therefore that you will return a response to us on this urgent matter, without further delay.
